#### **RECIPE - Cold or Flu Remedy**

In a small spray bottle (2 or 3 oz) add 91% alcohol until the bottle is nearly full. Add 6 drops of tea tree oil and 15 drops each of lavender oil and peppermint oil. Shake to mix. Spray and inhale the mixture. You can spray the mixture into the palm of your hand or on a clean cloth to inhale the vapors. Can be used several times per day as needed.

# Tips for growing the best tomatoes in our climate

• Start with seed or plant varieties known to grow and produce well in our area.



- Select varieties with shorter "days to maturity" (DTM), the shorter the better. Most seed packets or plants will list DTM. NOTE: Our growing season = 90 +/- days.
- Start your seeds indoors to be ready to plant after the last frost. (Learn about this in our March Workshop!)
- Once the seeds have sprouted and it is time to move them outside, grow the plants in a well-ventilated hoop-house or other covered area that provides lots of direct sunlight. Provide light shade over them from mid-to late-afternoon. This will protect them from wind, hail, sunburn and cool night air.
- Use your black light flashlight (provided to members) to detect and remove tomato horn worms immediately when found.
- Keep the soil moist but not soggy.
- Pick when ripe, enjoy and share with others Yumm!!

## **5 Best Tips for Starting Seedlings**

#### 1. Potting mix matters (especially in recent years)

It is recommended to use "seed starting" mixes (Jiffy Organic Seed Starting mix, if you can find it), or invest in a high quality mix.

#### 2. Keep 'em cozy

In order to germinate, seeds need both warmth and moisture-consistency is key with both factors! Shoot for temperature of 75 to 90 degrees for optimal germination. You can use a room heater or warming mats (probably more cost effective).

#### 3. Drying out = Death

Water from the bottom, which encourages better root formation. It is OK for the top of the soil to be dry, but never let the bottom dry out. Remember, seedlings can also die from drowning, so don't allow them to sit in standing water.

#### 4. Light Really, REALLY matters

Placing seedlings in a south-facing window rarely provides enough light. Full-spectrum LED lights are a worthy investment that will yield results for years to come. Use the lights close, 4 to 6 inches when first sprouting then raise the lights as the plants grow. Aim for 16 to 18 hours of light per day for seedlings, and about 12 hours per day for larger plants. It is recommended to provide 20-40 watts per square foot.


#### 5. Skip the egg cartons and yogurt cups

While it may be disappointing to discard your "recyclable" household items, seed starting trays are one area where it makes sense to invest a little cash. Good quality trays are worth the extra money because you don't have to buy new ones every year.
